

# About the Tending & Gathering Garden

The two-acre Tending and Gathering Garden (TGG) is a restored native plant site located in the homeland of the Wintun People.

It is culturally stewarded by Wintun descendants in a historically rich area inside the Cache Creek Nature Preserve (CCNP).

This cultural ambience provides a place for "hands-on" education; including plant identification, plant use and traditional management methods.

By reflecting on Wintun Homeland Teachings, TEK participants build a sense of place and self-awareness within the Wintun Homeland environment.



With guidance and discipline, students will build confidence and obtain skills to gain cultural competence. Being part of gathering materials is as essential as knowing the whole process.



Diana Almendariz is a well-known Maidu-Wintun cultural expert and teacher. For more than 30 years, she has dedicated her life to sharing the culture, art and life lessons of her California Native heritage.



If you are interested in learning about ecological stewardship - specifically what it takes to maintain a healthy environment and the role of responsible stewardship in supporting the health of people and culture - this is a great place to begin!



These teachings will include information about native species of plants and how to best manage them for the animals and peoples usages, using traditional/cultural methods of management.



Being present and aware plays a major role in hands on learning. Using all your senses will help you become aware of your sense of place and homeland in the world.
